Quin TidyTowns

Quin TidyTowns had another fantastic Christmas Tree Lighting get together in their redeveloped fountain area, with Santa switching on the lights, and their two beautiful choirs junior and senior entertaining the crowds. The redevelopment work took place throughout 2023 and was funded by the local community and the Department of Rural and Community Development Town & Village Renewal Scheme. An official opening will take place later in the year.

Quin also held a Remembrance Gathering on December 31st 2023, to remember all members of the community that died during 2023 and to acknowledge the significance of community as we enter 2024. The event included a candle lit walk from Quin Abbey to the redeveloped fountain area and thereafter the beautiful senior choir sang three pieces after two reflections were read by members of our community. Despite the atrocious weather, over 150 people gathered in a poignant yet beautiful community gathering.



Quin Village TidyTowns have a very busy year ahead, with the usual weeding, painting, cleaning, mowing, strimming and planting. Planning is also well underway on a number of new sustainability and biodiversity initiatives, including a Preloved Fashion Event themed around vintage and sustainability in March followed by a 'Cash for Clobber' where the community is being asked to recycle clothing. Quin have

also secured funding for a village energy survey which will take place later in the year. A village wide bird, insect/bee and butterfly boxes and hotel plan is well underway with community members recycling wood for bird boxes and bee hotels – it's all go in Quin Village TidyTowns for 2024.





Arklow TidyTowns

Arklow TidyTowns had their first outing in 2024 on a bitterly cold day in January. Their crew of 10 began weeding and sweeping one of the pocket gardens in Arklow town, the Seafarer Memorial garden. As you can see, the winter plants were out in colour.

After a sweep and a tidy up, the group enjoyed warm soup and sandwiches. Volunteering with TidyTowns is more than just hard work – it is a day out with friends old and new!

Howth TidyTowns are keen followers of all other TidyTowns Groups- through this Newsletter, RTE's Nationwide & Social Media platforms. Good ideas give birth to more excellent projects nationwide.

Howth Peninsula is a muchloved area-locally, nationally & internationally, but many people may not be aware that although we are a peninsula with a small village within easy reach of our capital city, we receive annual visitors comparable to those of Killarney.

Howth TidyTowns Volunteers grew substantially in Lockdown, so we were delighted to receive praise for our planting in last year's Adjudication Report, plus encouragement to share details of our planting with readers. We selected areas we have planted since 2018. We work in partnership with Fingal County Council who ceased spraying at our request, prepared the ground, provided topsoil and in some cases plants. Plants that you will notice in many of our photos are Nepeta, Euryops, Hardy Geraniums, Primulas & of course All the Spring bulbs-so listed below are other plants.



Claremont Cottages:

As you approach Howth Castle Entrance & Dart Station coming from Sutton Cross. This lovely area which gives such a cheerful welcome to visitors is situated Infront of a brightly painted derelict cottage. Here we planted: Red Crocosmia, Roses, Penstemon, Doronicum, Grasses.



Promenade Boat:

Donated by a local owner, this old boat totally sets the mood for a stroll around the historic calm of our beautiful working harbour. Planted with: Verbena, Osteopermum, Lavender, Carpet Rose, White Candytuft.

Promenade Strip:

Previously sprayed but now a delightful long line of seasonal colour which provides food for pollinators. Plants are: Aubretia, Heather, Lavender, Periwinkle, Woodruff, Sea thrift, Candytuft, Delosperma, Stonecrop, Creeping Phlox, Thyme, Saxifrage, Rock Roses. The Library Garden:

We designed & planted a rockery on this green slope at the heart of the village with: the donation of Howth Peninsula Stone, the guidance of Local RHSI Partner Gardeners & a North County Dublin Garden Centre. Planted here for year-round colour: Black Pearl Coral Bells, Cordyline Salsa, Strawflower, Stonecrop-Sedum brilliant, Voodoo, Giant Herb Robert, Erodium, Wallfower, Multiflora Rose, Red Crocosmia, Nasturtium, Japonica, Veronica, Tall Lilies, White Creeping Pratia, Chamomile, Fleabane Daisy, Ceanothus Blueblossom, Blue Salvia, Adjuga, Sedum-Mediovariegatum, Creeping Willow, Periwinkle, Creeping Thyme. Directly adjacent to the historic village & boasting old vernacular walls. These areas are a testimony to the industry of Our Maintenance Team who provide seasonal colour + pollinators by planting:
Penstemon, Hydrangea,
Agapanthus, Heuchera, Lambs Ear,
Indian Blanket flower, Campanula,
Rosemary, Lavender, Saxifrage,
Grasses, Cotoneaster, Hellebore,
Bergenia, Vipers Bugloss.



Scoil Mhuire:

Situated adjacent to Howth
TidyTowns Community Garden,
the sloping banks opposite the
school have been given a total
All Year-round facelift & food for
pollinators by Our Maintenance
Team, delighting parents who linger
for a chat or to watch their children

play together. Plants are: – Viburnum, Hebe, Escalonia, Penstemon, Nepeta, Achillia, Bergenia, Heuchera, Hydrangea, Salvia, Wallflower, Hellebore, Antirrhinum, Michaelmas Daisy, Periwinkle, Rosemary, Lavender, Brunnera, Geum, Nicotania. Top: Summer Blooms Bottom: Winter Colour

Castleknock TidyTowns talks to 'Green Sense' 'Earthology' about Climate Action, Sustainability Projects and Climate Heroes

Patricia shared lots of ideas and advice on how to engage the community and there are some real nuggets in the podcast below about connecting with people, that could be useful for anyone looking to make local or neighborhood changes.

Patricia has a professional background in change management and training from working in pharmaceuticals. She has really used this experience from her previous career to help change hearts and minds. One project, the CommunityCycle (reuse/repurpose) Group has saved over 6000 items from landfill in the last 18 months.

TidyTowns Groups and Election Poster Free Zones

As TidyTowns groups throughout the country are very concerned with environmental issues and the general appearance of their areas they are generally the drivers of local initiatives to reduce the visual, physical and environmental impact of election posters in their neighbourhoods. Here is the story of Castleknock TidyTowns (CTT) journey to declare Castleknock a Poster-Free Zone (PFZ)with some tips and suggestions other groups might find useful.

Castleknock is a historic, heritage village in an urban setting in the west of Dublin under the Fingal County Council (FCC) local authority.

After an absence of 18 years CTT was reformed in 2019 and we set about deciding on our five-year plan. One of the priorities was to declare Castleknock a PFZ so we spent considerable time and energy researching how best we might achieve our goal before we went public with it. We knew we would get only one chance to get it right so it was important we had all our ducks in a row before we embarked on what was a significant initiative. If it failed we felt it would be impossible to reintroduce it as we would have lost the confidence of candidates, political parties and the public. Remember not everyone is in favour of PFZs and some would be happy to see the project fail, consequently much preparatory work needs to be done to get everyone on board and to do so long in advance of the next election/referendum.

The first thing to get clear is why you consider it important to restrict or ban posters in your area. In the case of CTT the three main reasons were :

- · To address climate change and sustainability.
- \cdot To prevent littering and obstruction of public infrastructure.
- · The safety of pedestrians and cyclists.

The next thing to decide is whether your organisation is going for a complete ban on posters or a restriction on the number of posters. CTT decided to go for a complete ban within a limited PFZ as we felt that would be easier to manage, fairer to all candidates and would address our three main concerns outlined above.

Top Tip: Include politicians public meeting posters in your ban/ restrictions as they are often used extensively during the run up to elections.

The final major decision is to determine the geographical area to be covered under the initiative. CTT's main objective was to protect Castleknock Village so the PFZ was confined to a short stretch through the village plus limited sections of the approach roads . In our view it is important not to be greedy by having too large a PFZ . Instead, confine it to the essential area and allow candidates ample opportunities to display their posters outside of the PFZ. In our case it would be impossible to travel into or out of the village of Castleknock without being exposed to a significant number of posters on each of the approach roads outside of the PFZ, a matter appreciated by the candidates.

Having decided on these issues the next step is to advise all candidates and parties of the details of the initiative. This needs to be done well in advance of the next election/referendum so that candidates can make plans to adjust their poster purchases/ campaigns/ budgets accordingly. In our case we gave almost 12 months notice in advance of the next election. To avoid any confusion you should make it absolutely clear where the PFZ begins and ends. We drew a detailed map showing the boundaries and accompanied it with photographs and written details.

We put a very significant effort into getting buy-in well in advance of the next election. For example, for the local elections, we wrote by email to all existing councillors (and parties) in the Castleknock local electoral area seeking their buy-in and commitment, in







writing, ahead of time. Then we approached all other candidates just as soon as they announced they were planning to stand for election in our area and ensured we also got their commitment in writing. We knew cross-party buy-in and commitment from the top was essential so we held a number of meetings/discussions with various senior party representatives to secure all of that

Top Tip: Keep those commitment emails on file as you may need to rely on them later!

Our next step was to let the denizens of Castleknock know about the project so we published details of the PFZ initiative on social media as well as sending a press release to all local media channels. Our local radio station Phoenix FM carried a live interview with two representatives of CTT and in our newsletter to all residents of Castleknock we promoted the project.

Remember adherence to any poster ban/ restriction is on a voluntary basis as legally candidates are permitted to display their posters in accordance with various laws, rules and regulations overseen by the local authority. So you need to win over the support of all candidates by showing your initiative is fair to all, including first time candidates.

Incidentally an argument often put forward is that poster bans/ restrictions are particularly harmful to first time candidates trying to get their names into the public domain. However here in Castleknock during the recent local elections 50% (3 out of 6) of the successfully elected candidates were first time candidates for county council seats in this local electoral area so that surely disproves the argument.

Very importantly we put forward a novel suggestion to our local authority (FCC) that Castleknock trials a pilot project whereby in return for candidates adhering to the PFZ the County Council would erect a large poster board in a central prominent location in the village where every candidate could display one poster with their details/ policies etc and even list a QR code with a link for more details. This practice is very common in many European countries and if the pilot project was successful in Castleknock it could be rolled out throughout the country. Unfortunately we did not get buy-in from Fingal Co Co on this occasion. Nonetheless we will continue promoting and advocating this scheme for the next election. Indeed we suggest other TidyTowns groups likewise propose this scheme to their local authorities and politicians. Together we might bring about change for the benefit

of our communities.

So, was Castleknock TidyTowns Poster-Free Zone initiative a success? Yes, a resounding success. We first put it into action for the referendums held on 8 March 2024. We got excellent support from the candidates/ parties and this gave us great encouragement as it was evident we could mount a successful PFZ initiative with the cooperation of all concerned. The Local and European elections held on 7 June presented much more of a challenge as here in Castleknock we had 32 candidates vying for attention and many of them were unknown to us or indeed the electorate. Despite our best efforts many of them and their poster teams were unfamiliar with our area and the boundaries of our PFZ. Initially it was like herding cats and playing Whack a Mole at the same time as no sooner did we get a candidate to remove their posters from the PFZ another candidate's posters would pop up. However things settled down after a while and we received great cooperation from the candidates and Castleknock PFZ was often described as an oasis of calm in an otherwise cluttered city streetscape.

Top Tip: During the period of the election campaign it is essential to constantly monitor for any breaches of the PFZ and to immediately inform the relevant candidates campaign teams requesting prompt removal of any posters. It only takes one candidate/party to ignore the PFZ then others feel they need to do likewise and the scheme collapses.

We received very positive feedback on the success of the project from Castleknock residents, and indeed others passing through the village, so for the upcoming general election, expected to be held by March 2025, we will of course continue with the initiative and request all candidates to once again respect the Castleknock Poster-Free Zone.

We wonder what your experience has been in organising PFZs or poster reductions/restrictions in your area and if you have any advice or tips to offer other TidyTowns group? Perhaps the SuperValu TidyTowns Newsletter will publish them in the next edition.

Rush TidyTowns

On Sunday the 3rd of March 30 volunteers from Rush Clean Costs group, and from further afield planted Marram grass on part of the Sand Dunes on South Beach in Rush. Coastal Erosion is a constant issue here with the sand dunes disappearing bit by bit. but the Marram grass helps tie the sand together and provides at least some form of barrier to erosion. Aine Lawless from Clean Coast Ireland oversaw the planting process with the volunteers transplanting the grass from densely populated areas to the bare section of dunes. Brendan O'Reilly, from Rush Clean Coasts said that this is the second planting event we have held with Aine, and to see the results from the last time in May 2023 it certainty motivated us to get out again and in bigger numbers. He thanked all the volunteers and added that we plan to have a further event later in Spring.





Sunday the 24th of March saw the first big event in the "Let's Play Rush" calendar taking place for 2024. Up to 1,000 people came along to the now annual Easter Fun day, with an egg trail around the woods, games, music, a sensory tent, Penalty kick, face-painting, refreshments, prizes and the infamous sock fight all taking place in Kenure



Woods Park. The event was organised by volunteers from Rush Tidy Towns, Rush Community Council and Rush 38th Scout Group, with funding from Fingal County Council.



Rush Bygone Days book launch

We had a great evening of celebration yesterday in Rush Sailing Club with the launch of the Rush Bygone Days book. This has been a labour of love for 2 years and contains personal stories from 29 contributors capturing what life was like to both live in and visit Rush in years gone by. Rush Tidy Towns Chairperson Brendan O Reilly said "Thank you to Minister Joe O'Brien TD for Dublin Fingal for officially launching the book and presenting a copy to the contributors and their families who were there". Curator of the book Diana O Donohue added that "the event in Rush Sailing Club was very poignant, and we were delighted so many of the families of contributors had the chance to celebrate the launch with us". The book is a free resource for the community, and a unique glimpse into the past. It will be available on loan from Rush library and will also be distributed to the schools and other locations in Rush. It will also be available to read on line quite soon. We will also have a few left over to distribute to interested people in the community. This project was kindly funded by Fingal County Council and Creative Ireland.
